

## Prince Ministry In South Africa

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Greetings, July 2010

This month has been exciting, especially this last half. The children's home should be completed by the end of this month. This past weekend we had good interviews with prospective house parents and an assistant house mother. They are elders in their church and are very Godly people and consider this opportunity a ministry, not a job. We offered them a contract this week, but only the assistant house mother accepted the job. We have quite a few people keeping their eyes open for another couple for us to interview. If it all works out, we should be able to start accepting children by 1 September. Paul will be preaching at our future house parents church on 1 Aug. We have also had another lady (Ivy) who works in the church office agree to act as our liaison between us and the tribal chiefs, which will be where our children come from, and to become a member of our board.

There was a lot of small finishing work accomplished this month. In this picture Harry and Sello are installing carpet squares. Then a baseboard was installed around it. The last of the electrical and plumbing was finished. The main floor area was painted, along with varnishing and installing baseboards. And here is Micky painting the bathroom floor. Kitchen cabinets were cleaned up, repaired and installed. The end of this month we will have John Whitmore from the US working with us off and on for most of August. He knows plumbing, electric and some carpentry. We have a long to-do list for him. What a blessing he will be.



If you are wondering exactly where we are located, we downloaded "google earth", and our GPS coordinates are as follows: 24 07 51 07S and 27 42 35 73E Check us out. You'll see the big main building close to the road, a small white storage building to the right of that, also near the road, but on the opposite side of the property. Then one more smaller building about the middle of the property that is the toilet facilities for the camping area.

Earlier this month, Paul did communion service at one of our indigenous churches. He thought he was only doing the communion service, but discovered just before going forward, that he was expected to do the sermon also. He did a very good job for the sermon. For the communion service, Paul really stressed the fact about not taking communion if you hadn't accepted Jesus as your savior. Quite a few people did not take communion. Paul gave an invitation to accept Jesus after the communion and 11 people came forward. Then they took communion. It was an amazing service.

And just when you think the construction is finally finished, we decided to run ahead and get a small apartment built for the assistant house mother. The apartment will be located adjacent to the family home, so she will be close by if needed in the evenings.

The World Cup soccer tournament is finally over. We watched a few games, but didn't have time to be too involved with it. The town is quiet again with no more vuvuselas being blown at all hours. Unfortunately, for some reason, and the foreigners from other African countries are being attacked again. They call this xenophobia.

We have been donated two wildebeests already the last few months, and as you can see in this

picture, we just received a gemsbok. We have lots of meat. They makes a great stew.



After last months problem with the septic tank, and our large group of teenage visitors, Harry had the tank dug up and expanded. Now we need another large group to come visit for a few days and test it out for us.

Prayer concerns: Working out the details of hiring our house parents and assistant house mother. Ongoing construction work at The Fold. Setting up good communications with our house parents, our liason with the tribal

chiefs, and the tribal chiefs themselves, to ensure the children with the most needs are the ones accepted for our program. Good health, safety, and good relationships for everyone working at The Fold. Pray that the xenophobia will end.
