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Greetings, October 2010

It's been another unbelievably busy month. We started the month with our friends from Pretoria who came to build a playground. Hard to say how many people came through to help. They were trickling in from Friday morning through Saturday afternoon, and trickling back out again beginning Saturday afternoon until late Sunday. Due to electrical problems (I think we were overloading the system with too many machines, and the electric company kept going offline), the entire playground didn't get finished. Paul and Harry have been completing what parts they could, and our friends will be back soon to finish the job. In the meantime, one of the jungle gyms is useable, and the kids are having a blast on the swings. That piece of equipment only needs it's roof on. The other equipment still needs the bridge finished and the slide installed. Our guys were able to finish the fence and gates around the playground. Aaron and Jerusha, who have helped us in the past, brought his parents by to visit us. They had time to do a little tiling work in the children's home for us.

We thought we had all our required documentation to renew our visitors visa. But when we dropped off our package, they said we needed a police clearance from the USA. We thought we were going to have to return to the US, but we contacted the American consulate and they said we could get finger print cards from them in Johannesburg, mail them to the FBI, and wait for the clearance to be mailed to us. Needless to say, we made a road trip and picked those up. However, it is doubtful they will get back to us in time. We will end up having to redo some items because none of the paperwork can be more than 3 months old, and some of it is already almost 2 months old. It takes 2-3 months to get the visa renewed, which will put us past our date of 10 January. That's still not a huge problem. We can take a few days to go across the border into Botswana, which will put another stamp in our passport, giving us an additional 3 or 4 months in South Africa. But God is in charge of miracles, and who knows, maybe the entire process gets expedited along, and we get a new visa before January.

In addition to new playgrounds and visa applications this month, we are now "employers", which will generate the need for lots more paperwork. We are currently working through the process to make sure we've covered all that needs to be done.

We are hoping to be a little closer to having more children soon. One of the female pastors (Josephine) at the church has taken on the challenge of identifying other children in need. She

lives in one of the outlying villages and teaches first grade. She is working with other teachers who also may be aware of other children in need.

Our friend Martin from England has blessed us with the undertaking to raise funds to build us a much needed vegetable tunnel. Martin and his team of volunteers will install the tunnel next February. Of course it will have to be monkey/baboon/porcupine and antelope proof, which will add to the cost. But it will provide the Fold with fresh organic vegetables, and hopefully enough left over to share with other non-profits in our area. Harry is a born gardener and is very excited about this project. In fact, he has started a small caged in vegetable garden adjoining the kitchen, using donated chicken wire to keep the animals out. Last month Harry planted lettuce in the caged in area under the watertower, and we're all enjoying fresh lettuce.
